



Based on conversations with Utah Division of Wildlife Resources specific to our project we have been told:

- Utah DNR is tracking some Elk, Deer and Moose in the area (Snyderville Basin) however the majority stay on the Northside of I80
- These tracked wildlife migration patterns show are primarily East and West migration
- Park City residents and Gov employees have shown a lot of interest in research for migration at Exit 224 on I80 however they don't have much data now. Data is hard for them to collect as most of the property around is private with limited access.
- Highland Flats currently has the newer and taller wildlife fencing to help keep the animals from crossing I80 and I40. This helps but is definitely solve dangerous highway crossings
- The overwhelming concern for wildlife and Highland Flats is the concern that wildlife on that parcel will end up on I80 or I40.
